Roundup of Aliens

Washington, D. C .- The round-up of Japanese, German and Italian nationals suspected of possible enemy assistance was carried on as quietly as possible by the Federal Bureau of Investigation during the first three days after the declaration of war.

The purpose of this quick, quiet action was to prevent possible mob violence by angry citizens, or any other disorderly episode which might be seized upon as an excuse by enemy powers to mistreat American citizens located in enemy or potential enemy countries. The suspects taken into custody by FBI agents are being held for the most part at immigration detention stations. The FBI has announced that all aliens not suspected are to be regarded as good and useful residents of the United States.

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Legislative Report By National Executive Committee

At its November 1941 meetings the National Executive Committee's report on legislation said:

We recommend that the major program of the Legion for the forthcoming year (1941-1942) be comprised

of two points:

The National Defense program in full, as adopted at the Milwaukee national convention, and since the welfare and care of our disabled and of the widows and orphans of deceased World War veterans has been, and always will be, the first consideration of The American Legion, those bills pertaining to the disabled and to widows and orphans which have passed the House of Representatives and are now pending before the finance committee of the U. S. Senate.

The bills referred to are:

H. R. 4, the widows' and orphans' bill.

H. R. 4845, the bill to increase pay-

ments to totally disabled.

H. R. 4905, the bill to help combat-wounded veterans get service connection.

Write your Senators today. See that your friends write them, asking for favorable action on these matters.

Twelve Million Poppies Bloom In U.S. Hospitals

The largest crop of memorial poppies that ever bloomed in the United States is now beginning to grow in veterans' hospitals in many parts of the country, as disabled veterans begin their annual work of poppy making for the American Legion Auxiliary.

Last year more than 12,000,000 of the little red flowers of remembrance were made by the veterans and distributed by the Auxiliary on Popps Day in May. This year the number will be even larger, orders coming in from Auxiliary Units, indicate. Many hundreds of veterans, unable to work will be given employment during the winter and spring both in the hospitals and in convalescent work rooms maintained by the Auxiliary.

Worn to honor the dead of 1917-18. the poppies also aid the disabled ver erans and dependent families of velerans through contributions the pub lic make when securing the poppie from from the Auxiliary. This yes! the poppies will bring aid, too, 18 members of the present armed force and their families. Action of the Lo gion's National Executive Committee at its November meeting authorized use of poppy funds for the rehability tation and welfare of soldiers, sailof and marines of today who are di abled, and of the families of those losing their lives.
