Junior Baseball

Indianapolis, Ind. — Only one change in American Legion junior baseball rules for 1942 has been made by the National Americanism commission.

That change permits the acceptance of a player's birth certificate which may be recorded as late as January 1, 1942. Heretofore such certificates had to be recorded at least two years before they could be accepted.

The 1942 junior baseball competition will be open only to boys who are amateurs and who will have attained their 17th birthday before January 1, 1942. That means any boy born during 1925 or subsequently, will be eligible.
