If HAS been fought for, died for sometimes, worked for always. As someone said: "Freedom is not a heritage, it is a possession that must be carned by each succeeding genera-

Eighty million Germans have been working 60 hours a week for eight years building war machines to take our freedom away from us. The only way to keep that freedom is to build a greater defense machine—and we have months instead of years to do it. That means work as Americans have have never worked before-pouring every ounce of energy into every minute of every hour and day—and nothing allowed to interfere with work to meet America's desperate need. Not for "the bosses" (who, by the way, are not working 8 hours a day, but 12, 15, 18) but to save our wn skin, our own job and our family's future.

In four tragic words "Too Little Late" is written the epitaph of most of the peaceable and freedomleving coun'ries of Europe. Because there was "too little—too late" there neither peace nor freedom in Belgium, in Holland, in Norway or in Greece.

Berause of "too little-too late" the French have neither liberty or equality; the Serbs are hunted down in their own mountains; the Poles. Czecks and Slovenes are learning that the only alternative to freedom is slavery.

From such bitter lessons Amercia is now seeking to learn. We are striving not to be late. We propose not to do too little. And the first chill fact we must face is that neither can be accomplished in any lax or self indulgent spirit.

Commander Protests Removal of Records

Indianapolis, Ind.—National Commander Lynn U. Stambaugh has filed with the Adjutant General of the Army a protest against the proposed lenoval of military records of veterans of the Great War from the National capital city.

Previously housed in temporary buildings, the records, acres of them, recently were transferred to the basement of a permanently constructed building. Now the demand for office space is such that plans to move the records out of Washington have reached the stage where their removal about to become actual.

The National rehabilitation service of The American Legion finds almost daily use for the war records of the telerans. Hence, it is the concensus of Legion officials in Washington that a great disservice would be done the veterans' cause by taking the records out of Washington. It is on this basis of Washington. basis that Commander Stambaugh's Project was filed with the Adjutant General's office.



Veterans Evacuated

San Francisco, Cal.—The Veterans Admistration has evacuated most of the patients at Fort Miley Facility.

All but 40 of 335 hospitalized veterans were removed from the hospital December 10 and 11 according to James F. Mulcare, National Field Secretary of The American Legion, who kept in close touch with the developments. Mulcare was ordered to stand by at Fort Miley by T. O. Kraabel, Washington, D. C., National Rehabilitation Director of The American Legion. The 40 remaining patients were reported too sick to be removed.
