SUBJECT: Recruiting

TO: Post Commanders, Recruiting Chairman

- 1. EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY all applicants for enlisting between the age of 20 and 35 must present to the Recruiting Officer a statement from their Local Selective Service Board, that they are not employed in technical or key positions in War production for the Army or Navy and they have not been ordered to report for induction.
- 2. Forms for this purpose can be obtained from your Local Selective Service Board.
- 3. We are now stressing enlistment of the ages 18 and 19 for assignment to Army of the United States and men for appointment as Aviation Cadets.
- 4. I express my appreciation to all Post Commanders and other Legionnaires for the splendid co-operation in this Recruiting Service.

National Convention As Usual

Indianapolis, Ind. — The twenty-fourth annual national convention of The American Legion will proceed as scheduled. This was the announcement of National Commander Lynn U. Stambaugh who stopped here at National headquarters of the Legion overnight enroute to Washington to discuss civilian defense efforts of the organization.

"It is fully our belief and currently our determination that our national convention will be held in September 1942 in New Orleans," Commander Stambaugh stated. "It is our opinion that by the time of the convention the country will look with interest upon the actions and findings of The American Legion just as it has in previous years.

"No convention pronouncement of The American Legion with regard to national defense has ever proved wrong. Now that we are at war with the most vicious enemy ever faced by any nation, there is nothing to indicate that the Legion should forego its interest in the march to victory."


