The same deadline on applications is in effect for the five national president scholarships to be awarded by the Auxiliary to daughters of de-ceased World War veterans to aid them in securing their college education. Any local Auxiliary Unit may nominate a deceased veteran's daughter for such a scholarshin.

The Legion and Auxiliary scholarships are for \$400 each.
