From this time on "BE ON THE ALERT."

To secure the fullest co-operation of all Post members, the Post Commander has appointed Saxon, King, Penterman and Underwood as a special "Legion Cooperative Committee" whose function will be to confidentially receive vital information from the membership of Joe Carson Post, concerning the actual dependency and non-dependency of men who have been called for selective service, especially where some important fact is not known to the committee.

## War Secrets Bill

The most vigorous fight now under way in Congress is over Attorney General Biddle's proposed law to protect government secrets, or "war secrets." The bill would make it a crime to "communicate, divulge or publish to any person, in whole or in part," the "contents, substance, purport, effect or meaning" of "any file, instrument, letter, memorandum, book, paper, pamphlet, document, map, picture, plan, manuscript, record or any other writing" which shall be declared secret or confidential by any department of the government.

ing to this, point out that it would enable any government official to mark anything he pleased "secret" and it would become a crime to publish or even talk about the subject in any way, shape or manner. No such gag law was ever conceived in a free country, say the objectors to the bill, while its sponsor, the Attorney General, forced to admit that it needs revision, insists some such law is necessary to protect war time secrets.

Recent resolutions of The American Legion, both at Milwaukee by the National Convention and by the Defense Committees in Washington in January, are opposed to undue interference with freedom of expression.
