Americanism Report

BAN ON NATURALIZATION OF ENEMY ALIENS URGED BY COMMITTEE

Indianapolis, Ind. — Bols:ering of the Nation's internal defenses was the keynote of the Americanism report adopted by the national executive committee of The American Legion April 30. The report was presented by James F. O'Neil, Manchesler, N. H., chairman of the national Amer icanism commission.

Chairman O Neil particularly urged a ban on the naturalization of enemy aliens, and increased American can Legion cooperation with the to check seditious utterances and subversive activities.

At the conclusion of his report Chairman O'Neil submitted the lawing lowing resolution which the national executive committee adopted:

"WHEREAS, it is for the best of terests of the United States that en emy aliens be not naturalized during the present war;

"NOW, THERFORE, BE IT REDIVED OF THE IT REDIVED OF THE RESERVED OF THE RESERVE SOLVED, that we recommend by appropriate laws and regulations he passed immediately to prohibit he naturalization naturalization of alien enemies ing the present war."
