United States Army
Relief Fund Show

The rest of the cast is composed exclusively of soldiers on active duty.

The entire gate receipts will be turned over to the relief fund, according to Legionnaire E. Fred Johnson, who is finance chairman of the Tulsa committee promoting the event.

General admission is \$1.12. Reserved seats \$2.24. Tickets are now on sale at Sears, Vandevors, the Western Union Fifth street office, and at other leading merchants' stores.

Legionnaire Norman Hulings is in charge of ticket sales.

Military Service With Cobelligerent Nations

Washington, D.C.—Canadians resident in this country who are qualified for military service have the option of joining the armed forces of Canada or of being inducted into those of the United States, Major Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Director of Selective Service, announced today. Likewise, citizens of the United States who are resident of Canada may elect to be inducted into the armed forces of the United States instead of those of Canada.

Announcing that this reciprocal agreement also will be extended to include other cobelligerent nations, General Hershey advised local boards through their State Headquarters, of a revision of the list of "enemy countries," "cobelligerent countries," "neutral countries" and "nationals of the United States."

Symbolic Service

Indianapolis, Ind.—Because it will be impracticable for the second consecutive year, to decorate the graves of 30,000 American soldiers, sailors, and marines in national cemeteries in countries now occupied by Germany, the national executive committee May 1st, ordered another special symbolic service to be held by The American Legion at Arlington National Cemetery, Memorial Day, to honor the overseas war dead.

Blood Donor

Earl J. Perkins, chairman of the Blood Donors committee, reports that Legionnaire H. F. Hathaway gave a blood transfusion to J. A. Carter, of Dawson, who is a patient at St. John's hospital.

Spearhead

Indianapolis, Ind.—To achieve the ideal of "equal service for all and special profit for none," in the nation's all-out effort to win the war, The American Legion, April 21, after five years of marking time, renewed its legislative drive to obtain enactment of its long-championed principle of universal service into law.

A new wartime universal service bill, prepared by the Legion national legislative committee, was introduced in both houses of the 2nd session of the 77th Congress during April, to become the spearhead of the Legion's major 1942 legislative program.

Departmental Guards

Washington, D.C.—The U. S. Civil Service Commission has asked veterans organizations to direct attention to the need for departmental guards in certain public offices at Washington. The positions pay \$1,200 per year and the duties are those of guarding public buildings against fires, trespass and theft. Applications may be made at offices of the commission anywhere. Military and naval service are regarded as needed experience, or service as full time policeman, fireman, deputy sheriff, or guard.

The age limit of 55 may be waived for war veterans if otherwise qualified. There is no use to apply unless the applicant is willing to accept duty in Washington, D.C., at the specified salary. Sound physical condition, sight, and hearing are requirements.

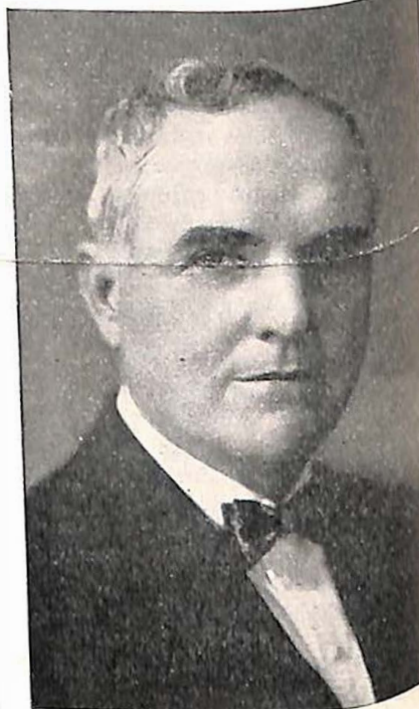
