Editor's Note

In the October issue of The National Legionnaire, resolution No. 358 was published among those under the caption "Resolutions Adopted." Resolution 358 was rejected on the convention floor and in its place Resolution 554 was substituted. The Resolution which was adopted is as follows:

Full Defense of America and Its
Institutions Should Be
Primary Object

Resolution No. 554.

Whereas. The ex-service men of America's participation in the war of 1917-18 are, in this perilous hour of your nation's history, looked to for leadership in the patriotic expression of the will and desire of the American people;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the full defense of America and its institutions should be the primary objective of an united American people; that our national defense effort should proceed without discrimination in employment, to the end that all citizens may avail themselves of their opportunity to contribute to and support our all-out defense effort. For more than twenty years The American Legion has had before Congress a program for universal service in time of emergency or national danger. We reaffirm the principle of universal service as applicable equally to the armed forces, capital and labor, and we call upon these elements of capital and labor who have been parties to delay, disturbances and strikes in essential defense industries to examine their responsibility to the nation in the light of the common sacrifice which all have to make.

We call upon our Congress to examine all public expenditures in fields not essential to the national defense, and to practice a sacrificing economy in non-defense expenditures.

We believe that if the necessity exists to peg prices, that the price and cost of labor should be covered in the same legislation which may cover the cost of food products manufactured goods, or other essentials of our life.

cases, WITHOUT COST.
4. SERVICE OFFICER and WELFARE
COMMITTEE looks after the family
while the Veteran is in the hospital.
5. Government pays \$100.00 for BURIAL
EXPENSES.
6. Joe Carson Post Memorial Cemetery—
no expense to Veteran's family for burial
plot.
7. Government furnishes Burial Flag.
8. Government furnishes a regulation Grave
Marker.
9. Legion has Orphans Homes throughout
the United States.
(Oklahoma is proud of its Orphans'
Home at Ponca City.)

AUXILIARY TO REACH HIGHEST MARK IN 1942

Heaviest advance enrollment in the history of The American Legion Auxiliary is pouring into national headquarters as the Auxiliary prepares to place its full strength behind the 1942 program of The American Legion.

October 31, 136,357 enrollments for 1942 had been reported to national headquarters, a gain of 35,652 over the same date last year. Many thousands more memberships were in the hands of units and departments, and in process of transmittal to headquarters. —National Legionnaire.

The chief aim of the local Unit is to "keep in step" with other Units, in carrying out the program as outlined by National and Department headquarters. To that end, plans will be worked out at an early date to begin another membership drive, in which we are hopeful of completing our quota before the Christmas holidays.

If you are a veteran of the World War and do not carry government insurance, you can procure it in amounts from \$1,000 to \$10,000, provided you are in good health. The amount of insurance applied for, plus the amount of government insurance now in force, cannot exceed \$10,000. Additional information and application forms may be obtained from the nearest office of the Veterans' Administration, or from The American Legion department and state service offices.

Insure independence for yourself and those dependent upon you by applying now — tomorrow may be too late.

The National Executive Committee went on record, November 7, for passage of bills by Congress pertaining to disabled veterans and widows and orphans. Upon the recommendation of Stephen G. Garrison, of Lowell, Mass., chairman of the subcommittee on the legislative program, the committee designated the following two point major legislative program for The American Legion for 1942:

1. The national defense program in full, as adopted at the Milwaukee national convention.

2. Those bills pertaining to disabled veterans and to widows and orphans of the World War who have passed the House of Representatives and are now pending before the Senate Finance Committee.
