Tuesday, November 11th

Indianapolis, Ind.—The American Legion's traditional observance of Armsitice Day will blanket the Nation in 1941 as it has on this day in previous years.

Heading the list of Legionnaires who will officiate in this observance will be National Commander Lynn U. Stambaugh, who will appear as the Legion's chief speaker at the Armistice Day meeting held in Arlington National Cemetery at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at the hour of 11 o'clock a. m., EST.

Every indication now is that the President will join with the Legion in this hour of observance, at once an anniversary of the victory that ended the fighting in 1918 and a memorial to the soldier dead of that World War.

As in previous years, details for the observance are in charge of the national committee on arrangements in the Legion Department of the District of Columbia, headed by National Executive Committeeman Joseph J. Mallory.

The District's National Guard of Honor again will be on the program to handle in its own efficient manner many of the details of the proceed. ings.

Networks to Broadcast **Armistice Ceremonies**

Washington, D. C .- With the President of the United States himself participating. The American Legion will observe the 23rd anniversary of the Armistice, November 11, with impressive ceremonies at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. The Auxiliary will join in the program.

All of the national radio networks will broadcast the addresses to be made by the President, by National Commander Lynn U. Stambaugh of The American Legion, and by Mrs. Mark W. Murrill, national president of the Auxiliary. The program will go on the air at 10:55 a. m. est., shortly before President Roosevelt will lay a wreath on the sarcophagus He will then speak to the nation. Commander Stambaugh and Mrs. Murrill will follow. The proceedings will broadcast until 11:30 a. m. est., but the program at the Tomb will continue until noon.

Commander Stambaugh and Mrs. Murrill will also place wreaths on the Tomb. Wreaths will be laid also by the commanders and representatives of the departments of The American Legion. All departments have been asked to send representaties to these annual exercises.

The American Legion Guard of Honor of the Department of the District of Columbia, will be on the job.
