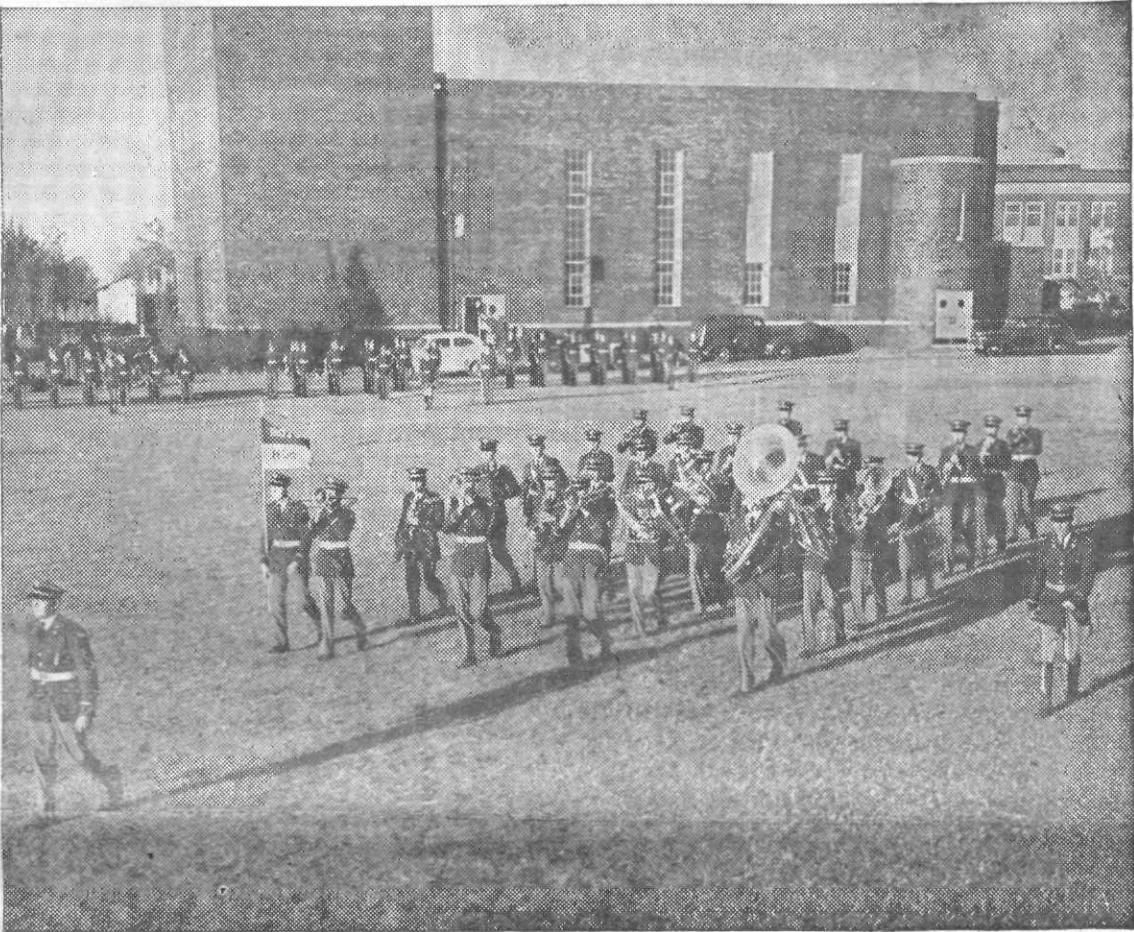

**N. Guam Air Force Base**

October 7.—Sergeant Donald E. Barnard, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. K. Barnard of 1235 South Gary, Tulsa, Oklahoma, is enroute to the United States for separation from the Air Force after completing a tour of duty with the 514th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron (Very Long Range) on the tropical island of Guam.

Sergeant Barnard was assigned to this squadron as a radio mechanic. His duties were to repair and maintain all radio equipment used in the B-29 Superfort airplane. This work was very important in carrying out the squadron mission of flying typhoon and weather reconnaissance.

**Lewis P. Clephane, A Legion Founder, Dead In Paris at 70**

Lt. Comdr. Lewis P. Clephane, 79, former Washington resident and a founder of the American Legion, died October 3 in Paris, according to word received by his brother, Walter C. Clephane, an attorney of Washington, D. C.

Comdr. Clephane was born in Washington Feb. 8, 1869, the son of Lewis and Annie Collins Clephane, both now deceased. He was educated in District public schools and was graduated from Cornell University in 1890.

He served in the Navy during World War I, and from 1917 to 1920 commanded all naval activities of upper Chesapeake Bay and surrounding territory. His Navy service gave him material for two books, "Official Naval History of the Naval Overseas Transportation Service During the World War," and "Official Naval History of the Submarine Chaser in the World War."

After assisting in the organization of the American Legion, he was made first senior vice-commander of its first post. He also was one of the organizers of the United States power squadron.

He was a member of the Army and Navy Club, the Chevy Chase Club, the Capital, Yacht Club, the Society of Colonial Wars, the Society of the Descendants of Colonial Governors, the Sons of the Revolution, the Military Order of Foreign Wars, the Military Order of the World Wars, and the Military Service Legion. His college fraternity was Beta Theta.

In addition to his brother and Mrs. Clephane, he also is survived by a sister, Mrs. Sybil Windridge, Arlington.

**Nagoya, Japan**

According to a recent announcement made by headquarters, 20th Weather Squadron, Private First Class Sidney C. Barnard, son of Mrs. May Barnard, 60 North Birmingham, Tulsa, 4, Oklahoma, has been promoted to the grade of Corporal.

Cpl. Barnard has been in Japan with the 20th Weather Squadron since June, 1948, with duty at one of its detachments located on

Hokkaido, northernmost of the Japanese islands. His duties as a Weather Observer consist of taking hourly observations and intervening special observations of weather conditions which might prove hazardous to aircraft flights. This data is encoded for transmission over a Pacific-wide weather network and is used by forecasters, around the world, to obtain a general synoptic weather picture. Furthermore, Cpl. Barnard decodes weather data from all parts of the world, and from same, plots the many charts used by the forecaster in making his predictions.

Following his entry into the Air Force on October 7, 1947, Barnard was assigned to Lackland AFB, San Antonio, Texas, for basic training. Upon completion of this training, he was transferred to Tinker AFB, Oklahoma, for weather indoctrination training. Previous to coming overseas, he was stationed at Craig AFB, Alabama with on-the-job training as a Weather Observer.

Cpl. Barnard attended Okmulgee High School, Okmulgee, Oklahoma.

**Nation Is Vulnerable, Says O'Neil**

NEW YORK. — America is almost defenseless today and therefore vulnerable to any Russian attack because of Congressional delinquent, National Commander James F. O'Neil charges in an article in the July, 1948, American Legion Magazine.

"Too many Congressmen," Commander O'Neil states, "have been afraid to take the necessary steps to protect this country for fear they would be called spend-thrifts and war-mongers."

As an example of "Congressional cowardice," Commander

O'Neil points to the fate of Universal Military Training legislation.

"Since V-J Day we have intensified our efforts to get UMT," the American Legion chief writes. "with a large part of the American public joining in the campaign. Yet action has been blocked by wilful, politically-minded Congressmen who lack the courage to permit Congress as a whole to vote on it . . . Our lawmakers seem to prefer substitute measures which will win votes while jeopardizing our national security."

In the coming political campaign, Commander O'Neil says, voters will be hearing much about civil liberties, the rights of labor, veterans' housing and tax cuts. Important as these are, he emphasizes, they are insignificant alongside of national defense.

Urging voters to make national defense their big issue, Commander O'Neil concludes:

"I am not going to tell you what party or by name what man to choose. I am going to ask you to vote only for the men pledged to real security measures. And I am going to suggest that you do not take those pledges at face value. Check up on the record of every Congressman standing for re-election—and the record of their opponents, too. Ascertain how they stood on Selective Service, on UMT, on the augmented defense budget, on the Marshall Plan, on civil defense, on the bill for arming the Merchant Marine and on the Communist question."

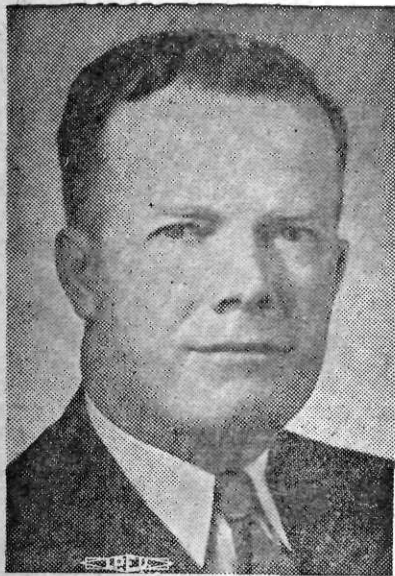

## Air Forces Issue Call for Ex-Airmen

The Air Force wants 10,000 former service men to help it keep the Berlin airlift and the B-29's in Europe running.

It called for them last Sunday as replacements for men whose enlistments are expiring, whose tours of foreign duty have been completed or who were sent to Europe for only temporary duty. The 10,000 will not increase the over-all Air force strength in England and Western Europe.

Qualified veterans will be accepted for enlistment in grades "commensurate with their ability and military experience." Needed are experts on aircraft maintenance, radio, radar, automotive repairmen and similar craftsmen.

Unmarried men up to 34 years old who have been discharged more than 90 days may enlist in grades up to and including technical sergeant. Dependents can not be taken overseas.

Air Force men reenlisting within 90 days of discharge automatically receive their former grade. All men accepted get an extra 20 per cent pay for overseas duty.

## O'Neil Says U. S. Must Be Strong

National Commander James F. O'Neil of the American Legion told the Miami Lions Club Thursday that prevention of World War III is the most serious problem in the world today.

The present "cold war" will continue for a long time, he said, and the United States must adjust her system and attitudes to that fact.

"Recent events have made it clear," he declared, "that the world must choose the Marshall Plan or the Molotov plan, Christianity or paganism, Democracy or Communism."

"We must make our Nation strong economically, spiritually and militarily. We can not sit by idly and allow the peddlers of hate to prevail."

O'Neil said this condition will be faced by the Legion in its convention in Miami, and he predicted action urging Congress to outlaw the Communist Party.

"At the same time we must guard the rear door against the

entry of Fascism," he said.

The American Legion, he said, will express again its determined support for universal military training, a stand it has taken since its first national convention in 1920.

"Then we were almost alone in urging such a step," he said. "Now more than 58 national organizations are fighting with us. The people have shown their approval in almost every sampling of public opinion."

"Why has it not become a law? Because of the political stupidity of some of our national leaders," O'Neil said the Selective Service Act is only a partial solution, due to expire in 18 months. He urged careful across-the-board selection of draftees, but said UMT must replace it to keep the Nation prepared.
