Non-Service-Connected Pension Cases Reopened

During the past few years, many veterans have been denied a non-service connected pension because their disabilities were not rateable to such a degree as to meet the requirements set by the Veterans Administration, or their employment records did not show unemployability.

On Oct. 7, 1948, the Veterans Administration released an order, Extension 5, to the 1945 Rating Schedule, liberalizing the requirements for non-service connected pension for veterans who have reached the age of 35.

Veterans who are 55 or more years of age, and have been denied a non-service connected pension, may have their cases reopened by addressing a letter of request for such action to the Veterans Administration, if there is sufficient evidence in their case folders to indicate entitlement under the liberalized provisions of Extension 5.

All such letters should be accompanied by a new employment affidavit VA Form 527. It is also suggested that where the claim was disallowed several months ago, a recent medical statement showing the veteran's current condition be submitted.

Where a case is reopened and an award is granted under Extension 5, the award will generally be effective on the date the Veterans Administration received the request for reopening.

Veterans having power of attorney with a service organization should send their letter and VA forms to the Claims Officer of the organization holding power of attorney, who will in turn, release them to the Veterans Administration.

Where an application for non-service connected pension has been denied, a letter similar to the following will serve the purpose for reopening the case: Veterans Administration Regional Office

The use of Extension 5 is not limited to cases previously filed but is applicable to initial claims filed by veterans who have reached the age of 55. Veterans under 55 will continue to be rated as formerly.

Philadelphia in 1949

The National Executive Com-
mittee chose Philadelphia for its
1949 national convention city but
not until after considerable con-
trovery. Invitations were re-
ceived also from New York and
Miami, but the housing problem
was one that was of concern in
each of the cities except Miami.
After it was seen that there was
a promise of 7,000 first-class hotel
rooms, which, incidentally, is not
enough, and with over \$50,000
available for pre-convention ac-
tivities and with a promise that
the Ladies Auxiliary headquar-
ters would be housed in Phila-
delphia an dmeetings held in the
quaker city even though delegates
would be in Atlantic City, 60
miles away, the executive group
accepted Philadelphia.

Judge Vincent A. Carroll, of
Pennsylvania, chairman of the
Convention Commission, was
questioned closely and Auxiliary
headquarters contacted before the
compromise was worked out. As
it stands now, Legionnaires will
be housed in Philadelphia and its
environs and will meet in the
large convention hall there; the
Ladies Auxiliary will be head-
quartered in Philadelphia and
hold its meetings in the Academy
of Music in the City of Brotherly
