Many posts throughout the nation will observe the 1949 anniversary of The American Legion by going over the top on their current membership quotas. Its birthday is traditionally a milestone in the annual enrollment campaign.

Members of the Post are going to be asked to spend a few hours at the house to escort people and act as ticket salesmen. Guy Belford said that every member should be able to contribute a few of his leisure hours in helping this worthwhile project.

For the small admission fee of 25c Tulsans will have an opportunity to see the latest innovation in low cost housing. The house will be shown from March 11th to April 9th.

The only materials needed for cleaning the entire house are soap, water and a damp cloth. Sunlight, salt water, chemical fumes or smoke will not affect the porcelain enamel finish.

The "Lustron" home has five rooms, plus a large utility room. Floor space is over 1,000 square feet. Easy sliding interior doors increases the amount of usable floor space, giving extra room for more comfortable living.

It comes to you complete, including built-in bookcase and cabinets, combination dishwasher clotheswasher, automatic water heater, radiant heating system, bathroom fixtures and screens.

Leading architects throughout the country are calling it "a new standard for living. A home that is easier to live in, easier to keep clean. A home of cheerful convenience and permanence beyond anything previously developed in dwelling construction".

Legionnaires should make it a point to inform their friends in the market for a home to see it.

### Payments to Vets Are Free of Tax

Gratuity payments to veterans for benefits administered by Veterans Administration are tax-free and need not be considered in computing income tax.

Tax-exempt VA payments include the following: Subsistence allowances for veterans training in schools, on farms and on-the-job under the GI Bill of Rights and Public Law 16; payments by the VA to be applied to veterans' GI loans. Under the GI Bill, VA pays the lender an amount equivalent to 4 per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan to be credited to the veteran's account.

Also readjustment allowances, paid under provisions of the GI Bill, for veterans' periods of unemployment and self-employment. Disability compensation and pensions paid to veterans for both service-connected and non-service-connected disabilities. Grants for paraplegic veterans for homes designed for wheelchair living. World War I emergency officers' retirement pay.

## New Bills of Interest To Veterans As Introduced By 81st Congress

H. R. 292

By Mrs. Rogers, of Massachusetts.  
Referred to Committee on Vet-  
erans' Affairs.

To provide that veterans now re-  
ceiving compensation for cer-  
tain socalled presumptive dis-  
abilities equivalent to 75 per  
cent of the amount to which  
they were previously entitled  
shall henceforth have such  
compensation restored to 100  
per cent thereof, and for other  
purposes.

Be it enacted, etc., That part of  
the second proviso of section 28,  
Public Law No. 141, 73d Congress,  
March 28, 1934, (48 Stat. 524; U  
S. C., title 38, sec. 722), which  
limits payment of compensation  
thereunder to 75 per cent of the  
payments otherwise authorized,  
is hereby repealed, and the Ad-  
ministrator of Veterans' Affairs  
is hereby authorized and directed  
to pay 100 per cent of the com-  
pensation otherwise authorized  
under Public Law No. 141, 73d  
Congress.

H. R. 288

By Mrs. Rogers, of Massachusetts.  
Referred to Committee on Vet-  
erans' Affairs.

To encourage employment of vet-  
erans with pensionable or com-  
pensable service-connected dis-  
abilities through Federal reim-  
bursement to any employer, in-  
surer, or fund, of amounts of  
workmen's compensation paid  
on account of disability or  
death arising out of such em-  
ployment.

Be it enacted, etc., That where  
under any law of a State, Terri-  
tory, or possession of the United  
States, or the District of Colum-  
bia, workmen's compensation  
benefits are paid for disability  
or death arising out of the em-  
ployment of any veteran entitled  
to or receiving compensation,  
pension, or retired pay, for serv-  
ice-connected disability, the Ad-  
ministrator of Veterans' Affairs is  
hereby authorized and directed to

reimburse, out of the appropria-  
tions of the Veterans Administra-  
tion, any employer, insurer, or  
fund, in an amount equal to any  
lump sum paid, or, if paid in  
monthly installments, an amount  
equal to the total sum of such  
monthly installments paid: Pro-  
vided, That the Administrator of  
Veterans' Affairs, in making re-  
imbursement of monthly install-  
ments, is hereby authorized to  
reimburse on a quarterly or semi-  
annual basis.

H. R. 137

By Mr. Battle, of Alabama. Re-  
ferred to Committee on Vet-  
erans' Affairs.

To make the educational benefits  
of the Servicemen's Readjust-  
ment Act of 1944 available to  
the children of persons who  
died in active service or who  
died as a result of wounds re-  
ceived in World War II.

Be it enacted, etc., That para-  
graph 2 of part VIII of Veterans  
Regulation No. 1(a), as amended,  
is amended—

(1) by inserting "(a)" after  
"2."; and

(2) by adding the following  
new subparagraph:

"(b)) In case any person who  
would have been eligible for ben-  
efits under this part shall have,  
while serving in the active mili-  
tary or naval service on or after  
Sept. 16, 1940, either (1) lost his  
life prior to Jan. 1, 1948, or (2)  
received wounds which resulted  
in his death prior to Jan. 1, 1948,  
the children of such person shall  
be eligible for and entitled to all  
benefits (including the right to  
have paid the tuition and fees of  
an approved institution and to  
receive a subsistence allowance  
while pursuing an approved  
course) to which such person  
would have been entitled: Pro-  
vided, That in no case shall the  
total amount paid by the Admin-  
istrator for the education or train-  
ing of the children of such person  
exceed the amount to which such

person would alone have been  
entitled."

H. R. 287

By Mrs. Rogers, of Massachusetts,  
Referred to Committee on Vet-  
erans' Affairs.

To provide four years of college  
education, or the equivalent, to  
the children of persons whose  
death resulted from service in  
the armed forces during World  
War II.

Be it enacted, etc., That the  
Administrator of Veterans' Af-  
fairs is authorized and directed  
to make available education at an  
approved college or other institu-  
tion supplying education beyond  
the high school level for a period  
not to exceed four years to any  
child of a person who served in  
the armed forces of the United  
States at any time between Sept.  
15, 1940, and Jan. 2, 1947, and  
who either (1) died while in such  
service, or (2) died or dies at  
any time prior to or subsequent  
to the enactment of this act as a  
result of a disability incurred  
during such service.

Sec. 2. The Administrator shall  
pay to the educational institution  
in which any such child is en-  
rolled and pursuing a course un-  
der this act the customary tui-  
tion and such fees as are custo-  
marily charged.

Sec. 3. For the period in which  
he is enrolled in and pursuing a  
course under this act, such child  
shall receive a subsistence allow-  
ance of \$75 per month in lieu of  
the war orphan's pension or any  
other pension or compensation  
payable under the laws and reg-  
ulations administered by the Ad-  
ministrator of Veterans' Affairs.

## YOU SHOULD KNOW ALL ABOUT YOUR NSLI TOTAL DISABILITY INCOME BENEFITS

The Insurance Act of 1946 (Public Law 589, 79th Cong.) authorized a Total Disability Income Provision to be added to National Service Life Insurance. Under the terms of that provision, an insured veteran may receive \$5 per month for each \$1,000 NSLI carried, if he is totally disabled for six consecutive months or longer. Payment will begin on the first day of the seventh consecutive month of total disability and will continue during the entire disability period.

The total disability provision may be added to insurance already in force, or it may be embodied in newly acquired NSLI. Coverage may be based on not less than \$1,000 nor more than the amount of insurance in force, other than extended term insurance, in full multiples of \$500. To qualify for such additional coverage, a veteran must complete VA Form 9-1606 and submit it to the VA office handling his current insurance records. Evidence must be presented showing good health and the extra premium for the total disability provision must be paid. Even though a veteran may be disabled (provided the disability is not total), he may acquire the disability coverage if, before Jan. 1, 1950, satisfactory proof is presented showing that the disability was actually incurred in service between Oct. 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945. The "good health" requirement will be waived under such circumstances.

If the application for total disability income is approved by the VA, and the insured veteran thereafter becomes totally disabled as the result of any disease or injury while the disability waiver feature of the insurance is in force, the veteran will receive \$5 per month for each \$1,000 of insurance carried. But, such disability insurance will not begin until the veteran has been disabled for six consecutive months. To qualify for these payments,

the total disability must occur prior to the 60th birthday (or before the maturity of a 20-year endowment policy prior to age 60). In addition, the total disability must occur after the date of application, or the effective date, if later, and the insurance must be in force under premium-paying conditions. Claim for such total disability income and due proof must be made, not later than one year from the due date of the first premium in default, showing that the insured has suffered continuous total disability for at least 6 consecutive months.

The benefits which may be received under the total disability income provision will not decrease the face value of the NSLI contract. If a veteran remains totally disabled for five years and has \$10,000 insurance, he will have received \$3,000 in disability benefits and the beneficiary of the insurance may still collect the proceeds of the insurance upon the death of the insured veteran.

Furthermore, all N.S.L.I. contracts provide for a waiver of insurance premiums during a period of total disability, if the insured is totally disabled for six consecutive months or more. The same provision applies to the total disability income provision. Thus, the Federal Government pays the premiums and also pays the veteran a monthly benefit while he continues in a disabled status. Application for the waiver must be made and the insured must continue to pay all premiums (regular and disability) until notified by the VA of the waiver approval. However, such premiums paid by the insured during the waiver period will be refunded either to the insured or to the beneficiary if the insured veteran should die before he is paid such refund.

The premium rate for total disability income insurance varies according to the type of insurance and whether the insurance is added to an existing plan or is a provision in a new contract. Any VA office can advise as to the rates that must be paid for the particular veteran's age and type of coverage; it can also supply VA Pamphlet 9-3, which contains premium tables and other facts about this special type of protection.

By way of example, assume that an insured veteran is 30 years of age and wished to add the total disability income provision to a \$5,000 term NSLI contract by paying \$1.25 per month,

the veteran may qualify for \$25 per month in the event he becomes totally disabled. Or, assume the veteran wishes to add the disability insurance to a 20-payment life contract, which has been in effect for five years (60 months)—which means that the insured converted as of his 25th birthday. The added monthly premium will be only \$1.90, or he may pay \$22.50 annual premium—in addition to the regular \$125.50 annual premium.

Any veteran who wishes to acquire extra security for himself and his family—in the unfortunate event that a disability prevents him from earning a livelihood—should carefully weigh the advantages of the total disability income provision of National Service Life Insurance.

An early investigation of the entire problem of adequate hospital facilities for veterans has been promised American Legion officials by Representative John E. Rankin, chairman of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs.

Disrespect to the Flag

## Editor's Comment

It also makes our blood boil to hear of such occurrences. We certainly agree that the emblem for which our buddies fought and died should be worthy of utmost respect. While disrespect to the flag may be "only a case of carelessness" we wonder what those same persons guilty of disrespect would do if the United States government officials violated the principles behind that flag thru "only carelessness."

Disrespect to the flag is never excusable through carelessness or not and we feel that any legionnaire who sees the American flag being desecrated, worn out, or improperly flown should take proper action in correcting the situation. He should try to contact the owner or report the irreverence to proper authorities.

third million in 1949 membership today and was more than 45,000 members ahead of the corresponding period a year ago.

## LEGION'S GROWTH

Commander Perry called attention to the growing stability of The American Legion as reflected by the record building boom among its posts. More than 550 posts acquired their own club-houses during 1948, he said, either through building or by purchase. Since January 1, more than 100 additional posts have reported building operations.

"We are approaching a 50 per cent home ownership among our 17,260 posts," Commander Brown said. "This is a tremendous factor in the growing stability of The American Legion. A post that owns its home is a post there to stay. It has a permanent base of operations."

Keeping pace with its posts, the national organization of The American Legion now is making plans for the cornerstone laying of the \$2,000,000 new headquarters building in Indianapolis on May 5. General Dwight D. Eisenhower has been invited to officiate at this ceremony.

Since 1919, Commander Brown said, Legionnaires have paid into The American Legion more than \$150,000,000 in annual dues which have become the basis of its present prosperity. Total assets of The American Legion including all the real estate holdings, treasures and funds of all kinds of its national, state, district, county and post organizations are estimated at well over \$100,000,000 today.

The national organization now has a paid staff of 455 workers and an operating budget of \$3,500,000. This is supplemented by full-time personnel employed by the 58 departments and by a great number of posts. A total of 76 posts enrolled 2,000 or more members during 1948. Most of these big posts maintain paid staffs.

**OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS**  
On its 30th birth anniversary

The American Legion can count a great many accomplishments in the three decades of its existence.

It has achieved recognition as the nation's foremost champion of national security and Americanism.

It was responsible for the creation of the first Veterans' Bureau, now the Veterans Administration, and for nearly all of the state and federal structure of veterans' legislation. Its legislative successes included nearly all of the laws dealing with benefits for disabled veterans, war widows and orphans; the World War I adjusted service compensation; the GI Bill of Rights for World War II veterans; mustering-out pay for WW II veterans; terminal leave pay for the enlisted personnel of the armed forces; federal aid up to \$10,000 for paraplegic veterans for building houses especially adapted for wheel chair living; legislation providing free automobiles for amputee veterans of WW II; and virtually all laws setting up veterans' preference rights in civil service employment.

It originated American Education Week which has been observed annually since 1921 to focus public attention on the needs and accomplishments of American schools. It sponsors such outstanding youth-training programs as American Legion Junior Baseball, Boys' State, national high school oratorical contest and the school medal awards.

It raised a \$5,000,000 endowment fund in 1925, now increased to \$7,000,000, the income from which supports its national child welfare and rehabilitation services. It has expended since 1925 nearly \$70,000,000 in direct financial aid to needy children of veterans, most of this money going for food, clothing and medical treatments.

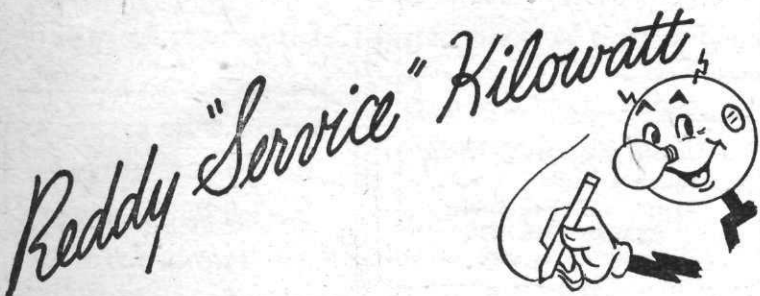

## American Legion makes "Fight of Its Life" To Preserve Hospitalization and G. I. Care

Washington, D. C.—The American Legion is going to make "the fight of its life" to preserve the right of specialized hospitalization and government care of all disabled and needy veterans.

This was the theme with which The American Legion opened its 26th annual national rehabilitation conference here. It was attended by more than 600 key rehabilitation leaders from every state of the Union, Alaska and Hawaii. All were aroused to a fighting pitch over the attacks on veterans' rights now shaping up under a mask of economy.

The sessions were opened with a fighting speech by Robert M. McCurdy of Pasadena, California, vice-chairman of the National Rehabilitation Commission of The American Legion. He pulled no punches in vigorously attacking the facts and figures advanced by the government to justify the \$280,000,000 slash in the hospital building program of the Veterans Administration.

His talk frequently interrupted by applause, vice-chairman McCurdy also turned his guns on The American Medical Association which he charged was sniping at specialized veterans' hospitalization solely because its members were after fees from sick veterans under its "program based on the dollar."

### McCurdy's Charges

Challenging the validity of facts and figures being used by the government and others in attacking veterans' rights, vice-chairman McCurdy charged:

1.—In 1940, the government, after expert study, agreed there should be 100,000 beds by 1950 for some 4,000,000 veterans of World War I and such a building program was approved. Today, however, the government is figuring on only 129,000 beds by 1960 for a combined two-war veteran population of 18,800,000! If the government was right in 1940, it cannot be right now. Today's view is depriving the veteran of World War II of his rights to adequate care.

2.—The fallacy of the government's policy of cutting back the VA building program on the ground that additional hospitals are not needed is shown by the critical civilian sick bed shortage. In Los Angeles County, California, a \$75,000 survey has just led to the launching of a program to raise \$87,000,000 by 1952 to build additional civilian hospitals. Yet in the face of such a hospital shortage there, the government comes along and now is closing the McCormack General Hospital at Pasadena with its 500 beds. The veterans hospitalized there have no place to go.

3.—The overall picture of non-service veteran hospitalization is grossly distorted. Actually there is minimum of unentitled benefiting. A great deal of disability exists that is known to be of service origin but which under present strict requirements cannot be proved.

4.—VA figures on the hospital waiting lists do not give an accurate picture. Thousands of veterans over the nation who are neuropsychiatric (NP) cases are in state institutions because they can't get VA beds.

### Warns of Attack

Declaring that fighting men are national heroes only until they take their uniforms off when they are forgotten, McCurdy said:

"That time has arrived. Again we have an attack on veterans which is starting like the one that culminated in the Economy Act of 1933. It takes the form as it did then. First the propaganda mill started. We have not had many articles in magazines yet

but they are coming. We have had many newspaper stories that have been aimed for one purpose or another at veterans, at veterans' benefits, and at expenditures for veterans. We have again the loose use of figures on the cost of the care of the veteran. These costs have not been reconciled with the costs of other things that our government has seen fit to spend money for."

Reviewing the government's 1940 program of 100,000 beds by 1950 for 4,000,000 World War I veterans, now cutback to 129,000 beds by 1960 for 18,800,000 veterans of two wars, McCurdy said:

"I want to call your attention to the fact The American Legion is asking only for a continuation of a policy that was adopted in 1940 after expert study. We are asking for a continuation of a policy that was in force and effect for nine years. We believe the men and women who fought in World War II are equally entitled to the benefits and privileges and care to which veterans of World War I were entitled and that includes hospitalization."

### Non-Service Connection

McCurdy asserted that if the government goes through with its VA hospital building cutback program, "we are just not going to have the beds to take care of veterans in need of hospitalization."

Attacking the charges that there are too many non-service connected cases now in VA hospitals, McCurdy said:

"They say these are non-service connected. Now, who are the non-service connected? By non-service connected as applied in the government report, it means those veterans who are in the hospitals and who have not proven that their disabilities were due to service. You men are all working men in rehabilitation. I pose this question to you: 'How many do you know who draw compensation that you do not think are entitled to compensation? How many men do you know who have actually beat the rap?' I do not know any. I know dozens of men and you working service officers know more than I do, whose disabilities we know are directly due to service and yet who cannot meet the requirements of the law to service-con-

nect their cases. All of you know that is true."

In conclusion, McCurdy said: "We are headed for a battle. But we are coming out with a program. I want you to go into this fight swinging. Don't let yourself get discouraged when you are again called treasury raiders. We have an issue that will unite the servicemen and women of our country. That is the proper care and hospitalization of our disabled and needy. If you can take it, if you can carry on, we cannot be licked."

## Omaha Retains Title of Biggest Post in Legion

Indianapolis, Ind. — Omaha, Nebraska, Post 1 retains its title of largest American Legion Post in the world. It enrolled a final 1948 membership of 16,072.

A total of 76 posts mustered more than 2,000 members each during 1948, according to a nation-wide survey based on reports of state adjutants, just completed by national headquarters of The American Legion here. These 76 posts had a combined 1948 membership of 258,830.

The Leyden-Chiles-Wickersham Post 1 of Denver, Colorado, again is the runner-up with 10,442 members. Memphis, Tenn., Post 1 is third with 8,279 members, and Harrisburg, Pa., Post 27 is fourth with 6,397.

Seven posts mustered more than 5,000 members each, three were over 4,000 each, 17 passed the 3,000 mark and 45 ranged from 2,015 to 2,901.

## New Patman Housing Bill to Aid Cooperatives Gets Legion Okay

Washington, D. C.—A new cooperating housing bill designed to serve middle and low income families and providing special consideration for World War II veterans today had the backing of The American Legion in the 81st Congress.

The measure was H. R. 2811, introduced in the House of Representatives by Rep. Wright Patman, Democrat of Texas, a Legionnaire. It would facilitate the establishment and financing of housing cooperatives and authorize direct government loans at four per cent interest if financing cannot be obtained from private sources. The entire program would be managed by a new federal agency, to be known as the Cooperative Housing Administration. It would operate under the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

### Taylor Commends Bill

National Legislative Director John Thomas Taylor, of The American Legion, described the Patman Bill as "the first sound answer to the housing problem of the average family." He said this legislation would carry into effect one of the major housing mandates adopted by The American Legion at its 1948 national convention in Miami, Florida.

"This bill would enable the veteran in the middle income group to obtain adequate housing at a price he can afford to pay," Taylor stated.

The Patman Bill would give additional federal assistance to three types of cooperatives. They would be the cooperative that builds houses to sell; the mutual-home-ownership type in which families share in multiple living units; and the rental cooperatives which build single or multiple units to rent to members of the group or to non-members who are veterans. Other provisions would enable authorized cooperatives to secure development loans of not more than five per cent of the estimated total cost of a project; direct the FHA to insure loans up to 90% of their value on units costing \$8,000 or less; and loans to veterans belonging to the cooperative would carry an additional 10 per cent of insurance, making possible 100 per cent coverage on low cost projects.

## Forty and Eight Club Construction Progresses

After seeing the new Forty and Eight Club, one of Tulsa's leading restaurants and night club operators commented: This club is without a doubt going to be one of Tulsa's finest.

Your reporters saw the club again last Thursday and fully agree with that statement. Amazing progress is being made daily toward its completion. H. K. Nelson estimated that three or four weeks more may be needed before it will be entirely finished for the great opening.

The lighting is almost finished and is the most unusual I have ever seen. Technically the lighting is called "cold cathode" lighting and has the appearance of neon. It is an indirect lighting brought into the ceiling and bar and can be controlled to be bright or dim. The rose and soft white light it gives will be very restful. The wall behind the bar will be mirrored panels, separating these panels will be cold cathode fixtures. The center of the mirrored wall will feature a lighted "Forty and Eight" emblem on glass with a light shining from behind it.

The floor of the club will be of durable asphalt tile. The walls will be painted predominantly, a pale green and white. Tables are incorporating a new and durable material, known as formica. This material will resist burns by cigarettes, acids or stains.

Frigidaire air conditioning system has already been installed to completely air condition the entire club and auxiliary room.

We are sorry to report that sale of bonds to help in buying fixtures for the club has been very slow. All members of the Legion and Forty and Eight are encouraged to invest in these bonds. Nelson emphasizes that the bonds are being sold by a Forty and Eight building corporation and that members are not being asked to donate money as these bonds will be repaid within three years. ## Vet Joblessness More Than Double

Unemployment among war veterans has more than doubled in the past four months, the Veterans Administration said last week.

Spokesman for the agency pointed out, however, that much of the increase in joblessness is seasonal, since major construction projects lay off workers during the winter.

As of January 31, the agency said 570,539 World War II veterans were drawing "readjustment allowances" — unemployment checks up to \$20 a week each. Payments during the month totaled \$37,921,000.

A month earlier 354,711 veterans were receiving the checks, whereas in October only 230,000 were on the jobless lists.

The peak weekly average of veterans claiming the unemployment allowances were 1,800,000 in July, 1946. In July, 1947, the average was 750,000 and by last July it had declined to 400,000.

About 8,000,000 of the Nation's 14,500,000 World War II veterans have received one or more unemployment checks, the agency said. Payments from the start of the program in September, 1944, through last November 30, totaled \$2,781,201,814.

Samoa was the sharp exception to the recent jobless trend. Last October, 304 Samon veterans were drawing unemployment checks, but on January 31, not one was on the list.
