All Legionnaires Urged to Support Paralysis Program

All of the Legion's activities are important to the welfare of the community, but one of the most important is the Spastic Paralysis program sponsored by the 40 & 8. If you have ever had the opportunity to visit the Milton Berry Home here in Tulsa, you will find great satisfaction in doing your utmost to help these children ravaged by Spastic Paralysis.

At this great humanitarian institution, sorely crippled children find new hope through the generosity of those of us who realize that our contribution can restore life to withered limbs. The majority of these children are victims of spastic, infantile and cord injury paralysis; some have broken backs as the result of automobile accidents; others are inflicted with spinal ailments and twisted limbs. At the cost of infinite patience and your contribution they are regaining the power of motion.

Tragedy walks in this yard, for many of these children have been helpless for years, incapable of movement, prisoners inside the tombs of their living bodies. Some have withered bodies. Some have a withered arm, or a leg that dangles like a rope, or a crooked spine; others are in worse condays, friends made during strife dition and are brought to the hospital in wheel chairs or in the arms of relatives. It is an inspiring sight to see what the competent attendants and teachers are doing for these children with the help of financial assistance of understanding Tulsans.

It is rather ironical that a dance is used to raise funds to aid those who cannot even walk, but every Legionnaire can help this great program by attending the 40 & 8 dance at the hut on Wednesday, April 7th. 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

Merines Sent to Mediterranean Are Trained **Evacuation Forces**

NEW YORK. - The Marines, who recently were sent to the Mediterranean are not primarily combat troops as reported at that time, but are specially trained evacuation forces.

"Their job," the magazine reports, "will be to get Americans out of the Middle East-fast-if the time comes.

"The U.S. has established a Port Consulate at Haifa, Palestine; theoretically, any Port Consulate area has diplomatic immunity. There are 4,500 Americans in Palestine alone.'

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
