



National 'Employ the Physically Handicapped Week' October 3 - 9

A physically handicapped person when properly placed in a job will make a better showing than the average unimpaired person.

This fact, borne out by statistics, is being stressed by a local committee made up of representatives of civic and veteran organizations and the Oklahoma State Employment Service, for observance of "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week", October 3-9.

G. G. Schuette, Employment Service manager here and chairman of the committee, American Legion and V. F. W., stated that Tulsa agencies are cooperating in an effort to greatly exceed last year's observance.

Fewer accidents, less absenteeism, less turnover and greater production than the average workers were shown in industry by handicapped persons according to Bureau of Labor Statistics surveys made both during and after the war. This report is substantiated by a similar one from the National Association of Mutual Casualty Companies.

Various agencies help the physically handicapped get trained for jobs, Mr. Schuette said, but it is up to employers to give these persons a chance to show what they can do on the job.

Agencies here which train physically handicapped persons and help place them in jobs are: The Vocational Rehabilitation Service, the Veterans Administration, the Oklahoma Society for Crippled Children, the Goodwill Industries, the Tulsa War Moms, and the Oklahoma State Employment Service.

Placing a handicapped person in a job not only helps that person become a happier and more useful member of the community but it benefits the employer and the public at large, Mr. Schuette said.

The OSES placed 415 physically handicapped persons on jobs in 1947, of which 243 or nearly 59 per cent were veterans. In the first 8 months of this year 325 physically handicapped workers have been placed.

'Mobilization Day' Material and Plan Set By Armed Forces

The United States armed forces, for the first time, have a SHAEF of strategic plans which tell each service how it will fight if war should come tomorrow or in the next few years.

This was disclosed indirectly this week when the national military establishment let it be known that the joint chiefs of staff has completed and filed with the munitions board a listing of the materials needed for a sudden "mobilization day."

Preparation of this list would have been impossible if the hitherto rival armed forces—Army, Navy, Air and Marines—had not finally agreed on:

1. The precise mission of each service in war.

2. What materials would be needed for those missions. This involves an allocation among the services of such commodities as steel, weapons such as aircraft and industrial manpower.

The strategic plans, top secret documents, presumably are based on a number of assumptions and actually composed of a folio of alternate plans.

In making them, the joint chiefs had to reckon with the possibility (A) that war might come in the near future and thus be fought with present weapons and the present production possibilities of national industry or that (B) it might occur several years in the future and be waged with weapons still in the development stage—guided missiles, super-aircraft carriers, bombers of range and load-carrying ability not now in existence.

Also, strategic planning customarily must consider a wide range of possible enemy nations or combinations of nations. While Russia now is the greatest military danger, changing world conditions might produce other power combinations in the years to come. Thus plans to meet attack by various nations or combinations of nations must be ready.

Army's Deadline For Medics Reset

The closing date for applications from medical graduates who wish to participate in the Army's graduate training program has been extended to November 1st, W. W. Kent, Tulsa recruiter, announced last Friday.

Those selected may complete their internships and residencies in civilian hospitals of their own choice with first lieutenant's pay and allowances.

The physicians are required to serve a year on active duty for each training year at Army expense.

During 1948 The American Legion Auxiliary conducted 199 schools for hospital volunteer workers at which 5,815 volunteers were trained.

More than 500,000 members for The American Legion were secured during 1948 through the efforts of the Forty and Eight, its fun and honor group.

President Truman to Visit Tulsa Sept. 29

The City of Tulsa will be the host to President Harry S. Truman and his party Wednesday, September 29, when his train is scheduled to arrive at the Union Depot at 3:00 p. m. It is expected that Mayor Roy Lundy will issue a proclamation proclaiming September 29 as "Presidential Day" for the City of Tulsa.

The Carson-Wilson Post Band will be on hand as the Official Welcoming Band at the Union Depot, and it is desired by Post Commander Guy Belford, Jr., that as many Legion members as possible be on hand, with their uniforms or caps, at the station to honor the President, a fellow Legionnaire.

Immediately upon debarkation from the train a presidential convoy will proceed to Skelly Stadium where the President will be met by the O.M.A. band who has been designated to play "Hail to the Chief" and our National Anthem. Plans have also been made, under the direct Chairmanship of H. M. Ledbetter, Commanding Officers of Oklahoma Military Academy, for all high school bands of Northeastern Oklahoma to be on hand for a band contest at Skelly Stadium during the presence of the President. Five hundred dollars in cash prizes have been set up for first, second, and third bands; however, the Tulsa high school bands will not be participating in the prizes inasmuch as Tulsa, the host City, desires that these prizes go to the visiting bands. Each band participating will receive a large banner reading "President's Day, Tulsa, 1948." In addition to these banners for the band, each individual member of the band is to receive a small sticker for his instrument case designating that he did participate in the ceremonies for the President of the United States. G.I. Insurance Dividends

Long-awaited lowdown on National Service Life Insurance fund surplus . . . on amount to be divided among 16 million present and past NSLI holders . . . will come sometime this month.

VA is about set to announce for first time exact amount of money in NSLI fund, how much can be considered surplus . . . available for dividend payments . . . plus method of payment scale that will permit individual veteran to compute approximate amount he will receive as dividend sometime next year.

Imminence of announcement is marked by complete clampdown on insurance news by VA officials . . . that no leaks on this information will be permitted . . . that everyone be given the news inculcantly.

Actual payment of dividends . . . to all persons who have held NSLI contracts at any time for period of three months or more . . . probably will not occur until next July . . . possibly not until 1950.

Charges that Gray . . . on orders from President Truman . . . is preparing to mail dividend notices to veterans just prior to elections . . . were quickly exploded by VA . . . which explained such procedure would be impossible even if contemplated.

Had Sen. Styles Bridges (R., N.H.) checked his information before making charge on Drew Pearson radio program this week . . . he would have learned VA doesn't even have current addresses for some 10 million veterans eligible for insurance dividends . . . because these vets have allowed insurance to lapse.

In fact . . . this represents major headache for VA in insurance dividend payment . . . will require publicity campaign urging past holders of GI insurance to notify VA of present address.

Veteran Vote

Both major political parties making no promises yet . . . are going all-out for veterans' votes in November with heavy emphasis on those who served in World War II.

Outstanding American Legionnaires figure actively in vet-vote campaign . . . with two past commanders topping Veterans for Dewey and Warren . . . member of Legion's national executive board heading up Democratic committee's drive.

Republicans have placed ex-general in charge . . . veteran of both World War II theaters . . . Democrats have picked ex-top sergeant . . . veteran of World War I.

Regard for veterans' vote illustrated by presence at last week's VFW and Amvets conventions of prominent politicians . . . Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer . . . Republican Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. (Mass.) . . . Republican Sen. C. Wayland Brooks (Ill.) . . . Republican Sen. Joseph McCarthy (Wis.) . . . Democrat Rep. John Kennedy (Mass.) . . . representing widely different views on matters of special concern to veterans . . . housing . . . international co-operation . . . subversive activities.

Republicans have been showing the greater degree of anxiety on how some 18 million ex-servicemen and women will mark ballots . . . feeling confident of mature settled voters . . . much less sure of new voters with war experience behind them . . . especially in view of record of Republican-controlled 80th Congress . . . empty platform policy statement.

But Republican leaders have yet to open throttle wide . . . and key figure like Republican Rep. Edith Nourse Rogers (Mass.) . . . present at all leading vet conventions . . . strongly pro-veteran . . . is less than optimistic about veterans' legislation next year.

Current innuendos Democrats are playing politics with GI insurance dividend may forecast broad attack by Republicans on VA operations . . . heretofore conducted on nonpartisan basis . . . remarkably free from political attacks.

Both party headquarters will carefully indoctrinate lower echelons on all veteran angles . . . provide speakers for vet meetings . . . sponsor "Young" groups in schools and colleges . . . dispatch field men . . . mostly War II vets . . . around country to check local party efforts . . . carry torch.

Brig. Gen. Bonner Fellers (Ret.) heads Veterans Relations Division on permanent staff of Republican National Committee . . . is charged with revitalizing Republican Veterans' Leagues in many States working closely with Harry Colmery . . . American Le-

gion past commander . . . Topeka lawyer . . . chief of Veterans for Dewey and Warren . . . and with Warren Atherton . . . also Legion past commander . . . now chairman of Vets for D and W in 11 Western States.

Fellers . . . Regular Army officer . . . served with MacArthur before the war . . . went with British Forces in Middle East as operations observer in 1940-1942 . . . rejoined MacArthur in Australia in 1943 . . . acted as psychological warfare officer against Japan until war's end . . . was secretary-general to Allied Council for Japan . . . was retired November, 1946.

Martin V. Coffey of Middletown Ohio . . . top sergeant in World War I . . . directs National Democratic Veterans' Advisory Committee.

Appointment of enlisted men indicates party's interest in problems of "plain" people . . . claims Democratic committee chairman Sen. J. Howard McGrath.

Coffey enlisted in New York National Guard in 1916 . . . served in Mexican Border campaign . . . went to France with 58th Field Artillery, First American Army . . . saw action at Chateau Thierry, St. Mihiel, Meuse-Argonne . . . is member of national executive board of American Legion . . . was 1943-1944 national vice commander.

Leave Bonds

New York Times dug through its clip files on GI Terminal Leave bond situation this week . . . uncovered startling proof of accuracy of Army Times reader surveys . . . pointed out that our prediction of year ago on the number of vets who would cash leave bonds had been justified to within 3%.

Exactly one year after vets were given right to convert interest-bearing bonds into cash . . . between 74% and 75% . . . or 3 out of 4 . . . have done so.

Army Times prediction . . . Vet-Letter, Aug. 30, 1947 . . . was that 72% of bondholders would redeem them for cash.

Treasury Department figures . . . as of Aug. 31, 1948 . . . show some 10 million vets have been issued leave bonds having cash value of \$2,071,659,025 . . . approximately 7½ million have cashed bonds of \$1,549,362,100

Additional \$175 millions have been paid in cash to veterans whose terminal leave entitlement was less than \$50 apiece.

State Bonuses

Question of World War II State bonus payments will rank prominently as November election issue in at least eight States.

Washington and Missouri have just joined growing number of States already having bonus referenda on ballots . . . Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Minnesota, South Dakota, Wisconsin.

VFW's achievement in obtaining enough petition signatures to place War II bonus on Washington State ballot marked popular victory . . . since legislature failed to act on two proposals in 1947 session . . . will not meet again until February.

Approximately 200,000 Washington veterans would be eligible for average bonus of \$350 . . . financed through State bonds to be retired with proceeds of new tobacco tax.

Missouri legislature has just adopted resolution authorizing vote on constitutional amendment providing for \$400 maximum bonus . . . financed by additional 1% sales tax.

If all electorates approve new bonus proposals . . . total estimated amount of all State disbursements to World War II vet-

erans will exceed \$2.5 billions. Any future State action will add to this sum.

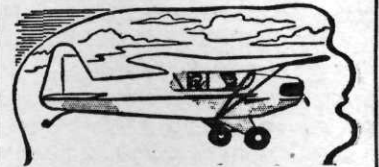
North Dakota voters and legislature have approved bonds . . . law will be enacted in January.

Pennsylvania legislation must be reapproved by 1949 legislature . . . then submitted to voters.

Nine States and two Territories now have bonus laws in effect

A total of 8,091,712 veterans of World War II has applied for readjustment allowances under The American Legion-fathered G. I. Bill of Rights.

Command and Staff School for Oklahoma Reserve, Guard Officers

Oklahoma has a quota of 25 army reserve and 15 national guard officers to attend the first special course on command and staff, to be held at Fort Sill, November 14 through 28, Col. William H. Craig, senior instructor for Oklahoma reserves, has been informed by Fourth Army, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

The Fort Sill course will be the first phase of a three-year series of two-weeks periods of instruction designed to qualify reserve officers for higher command and staff positions.

The November instruction period for Oklahoma officers will be held at Fort Sill, instead of at Tinker field as first planned. Attending the course also will be ten reserve officers and ten national guard officers of Arkansas. Four separate schools of this type will be held throughout the 4th Army area this fall, designed to train 200 officers.

Colonel Craig is asking all Oklahoma officers interested and qualified to send in their applications right away. He said those received by October 15 will be considered if within the quota limits. Reserve officers will send their applications through the unit instructors of their respective reserve organizations, while national guard officers will send their applications through the state adjutant general of the guard.

M/Sgt. John A. Walsh of the unit instructor's staff in the office of senior instructor, has been sent to headquarters, Fourth Army, for about four months temporary duty in handling details of the command and staff school courses throughout the army area.

To be eligible to attend this course, the applicant must be an officer of the active reserve or a federally recognized national guard unit. He must be physically qualified for general service and less than 51 years of age when the course opens.

Besides having indicated potentiality for command or staff position on division level or higher, he must be sufficiently grounded in branch material basic and advanced course subjects. Equivalent war-time service ordinarily will be considered sufficient grounding.

The schools are being conducted for the primary purpose of qualifying officers of the army's civilian components for the general and special staff positions to which they may fall heir.

They play the part of racketeers who prey on the emotions of a war widow (Joan Caulfield), to put up the money for a living memorial which they have no intention of constructing.

"Larceny" will be shown in Miami soon. It is recommended to all next of kin who might be tempted to let others take advantage of their love for their dead who died in war.

VA Signs Contract for Paraplegic Home Plans

WASHINGTON, D. C.—John E. Hober Burrows, Jr., 562 Fifth Avenue, New York City, has been awarded a contract by the Veterans Administration to develop basic plans for homes for eligible paralyzed veterans known as paraplegics, according to information received by the National Rehabilitation Commission of The American Legion. Burrows already has designed a number of homes for use by paraplegics.

H. R. 4244 of the 80th Congress, now Public Law 702, provides paraplegic veterans with federal grants up to \$10,000 for the purpose of purchasing or remodeling homes especially designed for wheel chair living.

To be developed are basic plans for a two-bedroom home of 1,200 square feet, net; a three-bedroom unit of 1,350 square feet, net, and a four-bedroom unit of 1,555 square feet, net. Each unit will have a combination utility and work room, a one-car garage and a kitchen, and suitable bathroom facilities. Special features will include ramps instead of stairways, extra wide halls and doorways, larger rooms and special bathroom arrangements and fixtures.

Miami Gamblers Plan to Cash In On Legion Meet, Says Paper

Miami, Fla.—The Miami Herald in a feature article has warned that Dade County gamblers were preparing to cash in on the influx of thousands of Legionnaires for the 30th national convention of The American Legion here, October 18 to 21.

The Herald said that Miami gamblers "have redecorated renovated and in many cases, constructed entirely new layouts for their crooked dice, wired wheels and shaved and marked cards." The newspaper also charged that some \$100,000 worth of specially rigged slot machines were being held in readiness to trim the visitors.

This newspaper article has led national convention officials of The American Legion to caution all Legionnaires planning to come here to beware of state-chartered private clubs, a majority of which they said function as "gambling dens" and "bust out" joints.

American Legion officials have discussed measures to protect visiting Legionnaires with city and county authorities and with the special service committee of 700.

VETS SILENT ABOUT BONDS

Okla. City.—There apparently will be no veterans bonus fight before the next session of the legislature.

Veterans organization representatives today met with the veterans affairs committee of the legislative council without recommending such legislation. The plan was boosted by the Veterans

of Foreign Wars in the 1947 legislature. It did not come up for vote.

No specific recommendations for legislation were made by veterans groups at today's meeting. Rep. John Russell, Jr., Okmulgee, presided.

Most of the day session was taken up with biennial budget requests from two departments and one institution.

Adjutant General Roy W. Kenny asked for an increase of only \$35,000 over the last biennium. The National Guard department asked \$253,000 annually for the next two fiscal years.

The veterans affairs commission, headed by Paul Cope, entered a budget request for \$675,820 for 1949-50 and \$644,480 for 1950. Appropriations for the cur-

rent biennium were \$501,000 annually.

The Oklahoma War Veterans hospital, Sulphur, asked an annual appropriation of \$320,540—more than was appropriated two years ago.

Miami Convention Mail Floods Legion Offices

MIAMI, Fla.—The mailman here will testify that the 30th annual national American Legion convention is getting nearer.

The volume of mail in connection with the big conclave here, October 18 to 21, has reached flood proportions. Thousands of letters are deluging the convention headquarters offices.

The mail has become so heavy that Edward McGrail, national convention director of The American Legion, has had to add five Miami secretaries to his staff to handle the correspondence.

The mail includes requests for advance registrations, inquiries about the convention from Legionnaires all over the nation, business matters and thousands of entries for the free prize drawings to be held.

Four new automobiles and a \$5,000 modern kitchen with every kind of electric equipment even including a television set, will be awarded at a drawing to be held in the Orange Bowl on the opening night of the convention, October 18. American Legion members, their wives, daughters and mothers will be eligible to participate.

Legionnaires who secure 30 new or renewal enrollments in The American Legion for 1949 by December 31, 1948, can qualify for an exclusive new national organization to be known as the "'49'er Club."

LEGION LEADS IN SERVICE WORK

The American Legion through its 17,116 posts is outstanding in many of its programs for the betterment of community, state and nation. It is in the forefront in national defense activities, in child welfare, in various community services and in such Americanism youth-training programs as Junior Baseball, Boys' State, Boys' Forum of National Government, high school oratorical contests, and sponsorship of Boy Scout troops.

But in one major field of endeavor The American Legion is supreme. That is in rehabilitation service to disabled veterans, war widows and orphans, and the dependents of veterans.

It has thousands of service officers on the job every day throughout the nation to serve veterans and their families without cost. While most of these are trained volunteer workers, The American Legion has hundreds of full-time, paid service officers. It has scores of posts with memberships of 2,000 or over which maintain full-time rehabilitation offices. Nearly all of its 58 departments maintain paid service staffs.

The effectiveness of The American Legion in rehabilitation work is best reflected by the 1948 Veterans Administration report on representatives of service organizations which it has accredited during the year. This is the list of service officers who carry the battle for the veteran to the highest government level. On this level The American Legion overwhelmingly dominates this field and is growing stronger annually.

During 1948 the Veterans Administration had issued 4,082 credentials to representatives of 68 service organizations under Public 844 of the 74th Congress. Of these The American Legion had 1,695 or 41.27 per cent.

The latest Veterans Administration figures show that while many other organizations are lessening their service work, The American Legion is increasing this activity.

Navy Air Training

The excellence of a military force cannot be judged entirely by the appropriations given it by Congress, or even by the number of men involved. The quality of training, the standards of morale, the character of leadership, the enthusiasm and dedication of purpose of those in positions of responsibility—these are among the factors, tangible and intangible, that make for military efficiency and spirit. In time of peace we must build our military forces with these principles in mind so that, if the need ever comes, we shall have a finely trained base upon which to create a vast, war-strength fighting machine.

The navy's present air training program is a good example. Now headed by Rear Admiral J. W. Reeves, who made an outstand-

ing record in his previous post as commander of the Naval Air Transport Service, it has the mission of furnishing the fleet with highly trained flight and ground personnel, both active and reserve.

To accomplish that, the Air Training Command has been developed into the largest shore based command in the Navy, with a composition of more than 400 units. Its personnel, in addition to providing instruction, furnishes all of the services required by the air stations—messing, maintenance, recreation, etc. The course is long, arduous—and, above all, complete. Of each 100 students accepted about 60 will win their wings 18 months later. They go through a series of courses from pre-flight, where they study such fundamentals as engineering, gunnery, essentials of Naval service, and many others, to advanced flight. When the last is satisfactorily completed, they are fit to serve with the Fleet.

The young men who meet the high standards of Navy air training are among the finest the country produces. They are readying themselves to perform a vital national service. And the Navy's system of training is unrivaled anywhere.

The American Legion in Illinois now has 1,129 posts and more than 226,000 members.

GENERAL MARSHALL PLEADS FOR THE 'RIGHT TO KNOW' — ESSENTIAL TO PEACE

By General George C. Marshall
Secretary of State

The theme of National Newspaper Week, "Your Right to Know Is the Key to All Your Liberties," emphasizes a fundamental freedom which our government is actively seeking to encourage throughout the world—freedom of the people to know the truth.

Half of the world's population lives under some form of censorship today. Denied access to the facts, people in countries where censorship and government control of the press exist can base their judgments only on half-truths or false information fed to them by those in control. Censorship and press control are the first and most important steps in the subjection of people by a dictator.

Americans should keep constantly in mind that no people have lost their liberties so long as their press remained free.

Eliminate Barriers

It is also a vital concern of ours to see that the barriers to the flow of information are reduced and, as far as possible, eliminated. This is an essential to the world peace which we are seeking.

Our Government is making every effort, through the United Nations, to reduce these barriers between countries. In the Commission on Human Rights, in the Economic and Social Council, in the General Assembly, at the recent conference at Geneva on Freedom of Information, and in UNESCO, we have pressed for active consideration of freedom of information during the past eighteen months. Progress has been difficult, yet it is encouraging.

Seek the Truth

A heavy responsibility rests with the press and other organs of information to aid in this important work. In their best traditions, it is for them, in the language of the United Nations, "to seek the truth without prejudice and report the facts without malicious intent."
